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What this factsheet is about



There are many special equipment items that you can buy to help to manage everyday tasks more independently and safely.



Choosing the right equipment for you is important. This factsheet will help you make decisions about:

- what kind of equipment could be helpful for you.
- things to think about before purchasing.
- where you can buy the equipment.


Getting Up

Do you find it difficult to get in and out of bed?

A **bed lever** or **bed handle** helps you get in and out of bed.

This piece of equipment should not be used to stop you falling out of bed.

A bed lever has a handle that you can hold onto when sitting or getting out of bed.



Some are fixed under the mattress, and some are fixed to the bed frame.



It's important to make sure that bed levers are safe and sturdy to avoid accidents.

Follow manufactures guidelines to avoid being trapped or other risks.



Do you find it difficult to sit down or get up from a chair?



Furniture raisers can be used to raise the height of a chair or sofa.



Using furniture raisers can be better than just using extra cushions as the chair's armrests will also be raised.

Some chairs and sofas are not suitable to be raised using furniture raisers.

Check with the seller whether furniture raisers will be ok to use with your chair or sofa before you buy.

Moving Items

Do you find it difficult to move items you need around your home?

A home helper trolley can be helpful to move items around your home.

Home helper trolleys should not be used as a walking aid. Please get in touch with your GP if you need support when walking.

The home helper trolley can be adjusted to your height.



Home helper trolleys with bigger wheels will be able to go over high door thresholds, and different floor surfaces better than trolleys with smaller wheels.



Washing

Do you find it difficult to get in and out of the bath?

A **bath board** is a seat that goes over the bath to help support you when you wash.

A bath board is a seat that goes over the bath. You can sit on this whilst you wash with a handheld shower head.



You may find it easier to wash while sitting on a bath board than sitting down in the bath itself.

However, a bath board will not be suitable for you if you are unable to sit without support.



A bath board might also be helpful if someone else is assisting you to wash, so they are not bending over the bath.





Before buying a bath board, you should check that:

- the edges of your bath frame are the same height on both sides.
- The width of your bath's rim is at least 1 inch on each side.
- Your bath is not a corner bath.
- Your bath is strong enough to support a bath board.



You might need to check this information with the seller of the bath board.



An **adjustable platform bath step** can also be helpful in supporting you to get in and out of a bath.



Bath steps lower the size of the step that you need to take when getting into a bath.



Some bath steps can be used with handrails for more support.

Do you find it difficult to stand in the shower?



A **shower stool** is a seat which can be sat on whilst you are in the shower.

A shower stool may be helpful if you struggle with your balance or become tired quickly when standing.



A shower stool's legs should be moved to a height where your feet can rest flat on the floor comfortably.



A **wall mounted shower stool** can be sturdier than a normal shower stool as it screws into the wall.



A wall mounted shower stool will need a fitting service and measured to your height.

Most wall mounted shower stools can be folded out of the way when not in use.



If you need more support on your back, a **shower chair** might be most suitable.

If a shower chair is adjusted to your height, you will be steadier when seated.

Going to the toilet

Do you find it difficult to sit and stand from the toilet?



A toilet seat and frame can help you move on and off the toilet by giving you handles to hold on to.

It can be fitted to many different toilets as it has legs that can be made shorter or longer.



Toilet seats have a weight limit, so it is important to check this before buying.



An **adjustable toilet frame with arms** might help if you like to have something to hold onto when sitting on the toilet, but don't want your toilet seat raised.

A raised toilet seat makes your toilet seat higher so that it is easier to get on and off.



You can buy different heights of raised toilet seats.

It is important to check that your raised toilet seat is safely attached.

Are you having difficulty getting to the toilet?



A **commode** is a movable toilet that does not use running water. It looks like a chair with a toilet seat and has a bucket underneath.



Commodes should be placed against a hard surface like a wall for stability.

The bucket will need to be removed for cleaning every day.



A **commode** may help if you find difficult to get to the bathroom.



You should check the weight limit of commodes before you buy. If you weigh more than 25 stone (180kg), you should buy a bariatric commode.

Standing

Do you find it difficult to stand for long periods of time?

A **perching stool** is an adjustable stool with a sloped, padded seat.

A perching stool can help if you find it difficult to stand whilst completing daily tasks like cooking.

Perching stools may or may not have arms and a backrest.

The stool's legs should be adjusted to a height where your feet rest flat on the floor when seated.



Perching stools should not be used in a shower or wet room environment.



Communication

Do you find it difficult to use a telephone?



There are many different varieties of **accessible telephones** available for people with visual, audio, or mobility disabilities.



Accessible telephones may have large buttons with good spacing between to make dialling easier.

Important phone numbers can be put into a device if you find it difficult to remember phone numbers.



Accessible telephones can be used with a hearing aid.



The volume can be changed to a level that works best for you.

Accessible telephones can automatically call another person if the first person does not answer in case of an emergency.

An **accessible mobile phone** can help you feel independent and stay in touch with loved ones. These are created to be easier to use than other mobile phones.

Some mobiles have fall-detection features, and assistance buttons to tell others if you need help.
