Energy Performance Certificates

An EPC is similar to the energy performance certificates now provided with domestic

appliances such as refrigerators and washing machines. The EPC provides a rating

for the energy performance of a home from A to G, where A is very efficient and G is

very inefficient. The EPC shows two things about the house:

the energy efficiency rating (this is based on how much the home would cost to

run)

the environmental impact rating (this is based on how much carbon dioxide is

released into the environment because of the home).

The rating is based on factors such as age, property layout, construction, heating,

lighting, and insulation. The ratings are standard so a tenant can compare the energy

efficiency of one home easily with another. The typical rating for a home is D or E.

The certificate also provides information about how much it is likely to cost the tenant

to run the home. These estimated costs are based on:

• standard assumptions about a property which include the number of

occupants and how long it is heated a day

Average fuel prices when the EPC was produced – these could be up to 10

vears old.

The actual running costs will vary depending on the current fuel costs and the

lifestyle of the tenants. A recommendation report forms part of the certificate. This

provides a range of improvement measures which could improve the energy

performance of the home
