1. PURPOSE OF THE REPORT

- 1.1 The purpose of the report is to seek approval to support and actively participate in the new UK Resettlement Scheme, which supersedes the Vulnerable Persons Resettlement Programmes that the Council has supported since September 2015.
- 1.2 In accordance with the Council's scheme of delegation, this report has been prepared to accompany the intended Officer decision of the Director of Public Health, Protection and Community Services.

2. **RECOMMENDATIONS**

2.1 To approve the Council's participation in the new UK Resettlement Scheme.

3 REASONS FOR RECOMMENDATIONS

- 3.1 Rhondda Cynon Taf Local Authority currently supports the Vulnerable Persons Resettlement Programme. This programme is very successful, with excellent partnership work taking place between third sector organisations, the University Health Board and the Council. There is also a very strong link with Further and Higher education establishments within our authority, and the co-ordinated approach to our work has received widespread recognition.
- 3.2 The Vulnerable Persons Resettlement Programme is being replaced by the UK Resettlement Scheme, so approval is sought to enable a smooth transition to the new scheme and to enable the Council to maintain active participation in the resettlement programmes.

4. BACKGROUND

4.1 On 7th September 2015, the Prime Minister announced a significant extension of the Vulnerable Persons Relocation Scheme for Syrian Refugees (SVPRS) (Currently named the Vulnerable Persons Resettlement Programme). The original eligibility



criteria were expanded to encompass the following 7 grounds; women and girls at risk, survivors of torture, medical and disability issues, sexual orientation or gender identity and refugees with links to the UK. The UK Government outlined an intention to resettle up to 20,000 refugees from Syria's neighbouring countries by 2020, arguing that it is better to take the most vulnerable people directly from the region, than encouraging Syrian refugees to make dangerous journeys to Europe.

- 4.2 To this end, the United Nations High Commissioner for Refugees (UNHCR) decided to focus efforts on identifying displaced Syrians at refugee camps established in the Turkey, Jordan and Lebanon region. The resettled refugees are granted five years 'Humanitarian Protection' status and have access to both public funds and the labour market. It has also been recognised that at the end of the five years they will be eligible to apply for permanent settlement in the UK.
- 4.3 In September 2015, Cabinet determined that RCTCBC would resettle families under the SRP and seek the commitment of Cwm Taf University Health Board, Local Housing providers and the third sector to support the Local Authority in delivering this scheme.
- 4.4 On the 21st April 2016, the UK Government further announced that it would work with the UNHCR to resettle children and adults from the Middle East and North Africa (MENA) region. The Vulnerable Children Resettlement Programme (VCRP) is specifically tailored to support vulnerable and refugee children and their families within the region who are at risk.
- 4.5 In October 2016, by way of a delegated decision, it was determined that RCTCBC would also participate in the VCRP, being the first Local Authority in Wales to receive a family under that scheme on the 6th December 2016.
- 4.6 The UK Government confirmed on 17 June 2019 its ongoing commitment to resettlement, announcing plans for a new UK Resettlement Scheme which will see thousands more refugees provided with a route to protection when it begins in 2020. The new scheme will consolidate the Vulnerable Persons' Resettlement Scheme, the Vulnerable Children's Resettlement Scheme and the Gateway Protection Programme into one global scheme.
- 4.7 The new UK Resettlement Scheme will be open to refugees identified by UNHCR to be in need of resettlement to the UK because of their vulnerability and does not have a specific geographical focus.

5. **EQUALITY AND DIVERSITY IMPLICATIONS**

5.1 There are no Equality and Diversity implications. The families identified as suitable for the programme are initially selected by the Home Office.

6 **CONSULTATION**

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6.1 Prior to the acceptance of any individuals into RCT as part of resettlement schemes, extensive consultation is carried out with various departments and partner



organisations including South Wales Police, Health, Housing, Social Services and Education.

7 FINANCIAL IMPLICATION(S)

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7.1 There will be no financial implications for the Local Authority. The funding package available under the new scheme will mirror that currently paid under the Vulnerable Persons Resettlement Scheme and Vulnerable Children's Resettlement Scheme.

- 10.2 The long term goal of the programme is to enable the resettled families to thrive and prosper in their communities and be part of a more cohesive Wales. The commitment and support Rhondda Cynon Taf has provided to the programme is ensuring that the long term goal is within reach.
