#### **REGISTERED CHILDCARE PROVISION – QUALITY UPDATE**

#### REPORT OF THE DIRECTOR, COMMUNITY & CHILDREN'S SERVICES

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## 1. PURPOSE OF THE REPORT

The purpose of this Report is to update members on the Care and Social Services Inspectorate for Wales (CSSIW) registered childcare settings overseen by the Early Years and Family Support Service (EYFSS) and on the action planning and service improvements within and by the staff at the childcare settings.

## 2. **OVERVIEW**

Across the EYFSS there are a number of childcare provisions that are registered with CSSIW: those that are registered and operated by the Council and those that are registered by third party organisations and commissioned to deliver childcare provision on behalf of the Council. How each of these childcare provisions is quality assured and monitored differs based on the service that each setting provides.

### 3. COUNCIL RUN REGISTERED PROVISION

Across the EYFSS, there are 7 CSSIW registered childcare settings:

- Aman Flying Start Childcare
- Four Seasons Activity Centre
- Penrhys Flying Start Childcare
- Pontypridd Day Nursery and Flying Start Childcare
- Tonyrefail Flying Start Childcare
- Tylorstown Flying Start Childcare
- Ynyscynon Day Nursery and Flying Start Childcare



Set out in the table below are descriptions of each service with corresponding commentary about the latest inspection feedback and action plan

The service provides 2.5 hours per day, 5 days per week, 42 weeks per year of Flying Start childcare. Regulation 25(a) The RI must ensure that all parts of the relevant premises to which relevant children have access are so far as reasonably practicable free from hazards to their safety, this is because the RI failed to ensure that the outdoor allotment area was free from hazards to the health and safety of the children including several uncovered water butts. We (CSSIW) have not issued non compliance notice in respect of this matter on this occasion. The PIC addressed the issue during the inspection and all water butts were emptied immediately. Following the inspection CSSIW were contacted and informed that all water butts had been secured with appropriate covers to ensure the safety of the children. This matter will also be a focus at the next inspection. 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The Council run childcare settings are closely monitored and supported by the settings' Supervisors and their line manager. Once CSSIW have carried out their inspection and the Inspection report is received by the Central Team, both the Supervisor and their line manager discuss the content, actions and recommendations. Any identified actions in the report are then included in the settings' action plan and relevant timescales are set to ensure all actions are met. The actions are then discussed during one to one supervisions with Supervisors and in staff team meetings. This is to ensure that the quality of care is shared with and disseminated to all staff and colleagues. Where necessary the setting may also contact CSSIW for additional support and guidance to ensure standards and regulations are fully met. No particular trends or themes are emerging from CSSIW feedback reports and therefore, actions are implemented as and when necessary.

#### 4. OTHER PROVISION

As well as the aforementioned childcare settings, the Council has relationships with a number of other providers. Each provision and the quality monitoring and support process is detailed below

Please note: the 'numbers of providers' includes settings that provide more than one service and therefore some settings will be counted more than once (e.g. a day nursery that offers Flying Start childcare sessions and holiday fun time sessions)

Childminders belonging to the Network also provide Holiday Fun Time childcare when required and funded childcare for vulnerable families via a referral system. Each Network Childminder receives regular visits to monitor the standard of their practice. There is a requirement for Network Childminders to register on the Bravo Procurement system and submit their up to date CSSIW Inspection Report within 10 days of receiving it.
Holiday Fun Time Childcare Settings 50 across the borough	Council, third sector or private sector childcare provider that is commissioned to provide Holiday Fun Time childcare. They may also provide Flying Start and day nursery services	Holiday Fun Time (HFT) is a scheme that provides children from 0-14 that require additional support (e.g. a disability, risk of family breakdown etc.), care during school holidays. Referrals to HFT are accepted from Social Workers, including Disabled Children's Team Social Workers and Team Around the Family. Children accessing HFT are only placed with CSSIW registered childcare providers. There is a requirement for the childcare providers to submit their up to date CSSIW Inspection Report to RCTCBC via Bravo within 10 days of receiving the report and the setting must have either completed or be working towards the RCT Quality Assurance Award or equivalent Award run by a recognised awarding body. Due to staff capacity, this is not monitored.

All childminders are encouraged to join their umbrella organisation, the 'Professional Association for Childcare and Early Years' (PACEY) which offers support, resources, training and their own quality assurance scheme, 'Quality Comes Home Award'. General support is offered via telephone by the Childminding Network Coordinator. Prospective childminders are also supported via two mentoring sessions to support them with their CSSIW application to become registered childminders. Non Network childminders can access the RCT Quality Assurance Scheme.
Play Provision  12 across the borough	Third sector or private sector play provider that is commissioned to provide open access play provision.	Open Access Play provides play sessions for children and young people from 5-14 years. Monitoring of play providers consists of regular checks carried out on documentation via the Bravo procurement system, e.g. up to date DBS of all staff, liability insurances, CSSIW inspection reports etc. Annual quality monitoring visits are carried out by the Play Commissioning Manager on all schemes; feedback reports are compiled and where appropriate, recommendations for quality improvements are made. However due to lack of staff capacity this does not mean further visits can be carried out to ascertain whether or not the recommendations have been implemented.  In 2015-16, a Play Outcomes Toolkit was developed with the support of Children in Wales. It is envisaged that this will enable a consistent approach to evidencing the benefits of freely chosen play on children's holistic development and wellbeing.  The recent CSSIW changes, meaning that childcare/play providers now need to be registered to provide services over 2 hours to under 12s,



		rather than under 8s, has had an impact on the direct delivery of play sessions the Local Authority has commissioned for the 2016-17 financial year. To date, out of the 12 approved suppliers commissioned, 1 is not perusing registration, 7 are registered with CSSIW and 4 are working towards CSSIW registration. Out of the 7 registered providers, 4 of them are in the process of registering an additional 6 playscheme settings with CSSIW. Out of the 4 working towards registration there are a total of 12 playschemes going to be registered over the next year or so. The Local Authority is supporting all interested providers to become CSSIW registered through training and direct support.
Four Seasons Activity Centre	Council run walking bus, afterschool, holiday care and Holiday Fun Time childcare provision	collects children from three local schools, walking the children to the Centre. At the Centre, an afterschool care service is provided five nights a week for children aged 3-11.  During school holidays all afterschool activities cease and a Holiday Care service is offered. Referrals are also received from the 'Holiday Fun Time' scheme for children with additional needs. Four seasons supplies one to one workers as and when needed, to enable full integration for the Holiday Fun referrals.
		Four Seasons Activity Centre is registered with CSSIW for full day care for 24 children. The last inspection was November 2014. The service had an independent review in 2014 in line with the RCT quality assurance scheme.

## 5. <u>CONCLUSION</u>

All services that are run by and have a contractual relationship with the Council and are CSSIW registered, are well monitored and supported by the Council's Early Years and Family Support Service. Business development and quality improvement support provided to settings outside of these relationships require a thorough review, to ensure statutory obligations are met. This review will be carried out in 2017.
